At dusk on Christmas Eve in the German homes, the living room door is opened revealing a small tree ablaze with lights. The Germans put nothing but lights and candy on their trees; each person's presents are arranged in piles under the tree.

Plum pudding, a crackling yule log and carol singers are symbols of the English Christmas. The English celebrate on Christmas Day, not Christmas Eve like most of Europe.


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Our Christmas tree in Room 3 adds much to the Christmas spirit. We drew names and it will be fun opening the gifts on the 23rd.
