

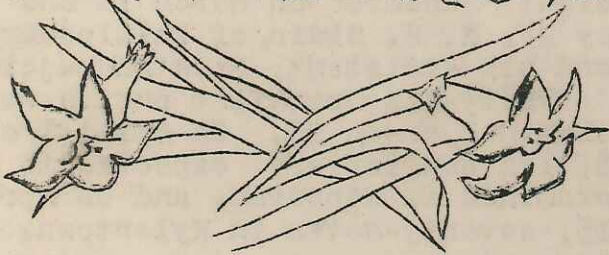

LIBRARY IMPROVEMENT PROJECT IN PROGRESS

The high school library is undergoing an intensive spring housecleaning under the supervision of the librarian, Mr. C. T. Ardary, who is assisted by Mrs. Zanada DiCicco.

A careful survey of all books is being made. Worn books are being mended, put aside for re-binding, or discarded. Duplicate copies and out-of-date books are being placed in the book room where they will be available if needed. Their removal leaves more room for other books.

This survey is revealing a large number of worthwhile books which have not left the library shelves in seven or eight years. Pupils are missing a great deal of good reading because they read only the most popular books. Librarians and English teachers will be glad to recommend some of these interesting but neglected books to pupils who ask them for advice.

Copies of revised library rules have been duplicated and placed in the hands of all pupils. Greater cooperation between pupils and librarians will result in improved library service.

Fifty-six Grassflat pupils were examined March 25. On April 1 and 8, 124 pupils are expected to be examined in Winburne, and on April 15, seventy-seven in Kylertown.

Last month's COTOHISC erred in announcing \$540 as the profit in the magazine campaign. Chest X-rays will be given on Monday, April 13, to all juniors, freshmen, faculty members, janitors, bus drivers, and cafeteria workers. The X-ray program is a free service sponsored by the Clearfield County-Philipsburg Tuberculosis Society.

Mrs. Venita Higgins, executive secretary of the Tuberculosis Society, was the speaker at the March meeting of the Cooper Township Parent-Teacher Association. Mrs. Higgins brought out the fact that, although tuberculosis has fallen from first to seventh place as a cause of death, it still causes far more deaths than wars. She stressed the value of good health habits in preventing tuberculosis and the importance of detecting it early by X-ray.

FROM THE COTOHISC FILES

Some interesting statistics in the COTOHISC for November, 1924, show a total enrollment in the schools of Cooper Township of 1355 pupils! Compare that figure with the present enrollment of 730.

Individual schools enrolled as follows: Winburne 436, Grassflat 316, High School 146, Kylertown 97, Forest 93, Lanse 80, Drifting 62, Pleasant Hill 43, Sylvan Grove 30, German 25, Knox Run 19, and Viaduct 9.

CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES

Senior English classes taught by Mrs. Robert Park have completed 2000-word term papers covering a wide variety of subjects ranging from deer hunting to the United Nations.

Mrs. Parks junior English class has completed work on grammar and is now studying the history of American literature. An intensive study of spelling ended with a spelling bee in which Ronnie Soder was the winner and Althea Lucas, runner-up.

The French II class was pleased to have two former French students, Joan Larson '50 and Ann Marie Johnson '51, visit them and help them sing French songs.

In the commercial department, Mrs. Raymond Larson reports that Audrey Netterblade from the Shorthand II class has passed the 120 words-per-minute test. Mrs. Larson points out that this is a rather unusual achievement for a high school student.

Mrs. DiCicco's junior business classes are having six-week exploratory courses. One section of the class is studying shorthand and the other section bookkeeping.

STUDENTS TAKE EXAMS

Eleven juniors and seniors took the nation-wide United Nations test on March 26 under the supervision of Mr. John Deliman. The two best papers will be sent in to be judged with the best papers from schools all over the United States.

The first prize in the contest is \$500 or a trip to Europe with all expenses paid. Second prize is \$100. In addition, each of the first sixteen contestants will receive a scholarship.

The two Cooper winners will also be competing with the other schools in Clearfield County for prizes given by the Clearfield Federation of Women's Clubs. A \$25 bond will be the first prize, with second and third prizes of \$15 and \$10.

Three senior boys, Mike Moyle, Steve Lucas, and Jim Palush, have taken examinations for scholarships offered by St. Vincent's College at Latrobe, Pa.

HONOR ROLL

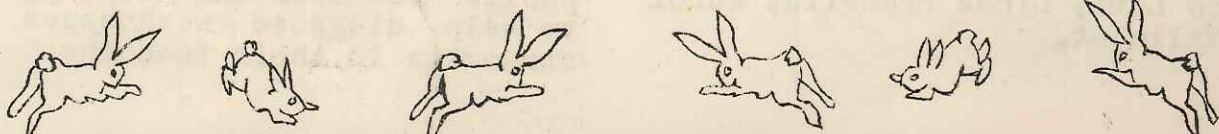

And that is the man with one arm.

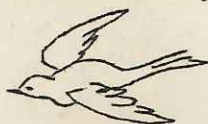

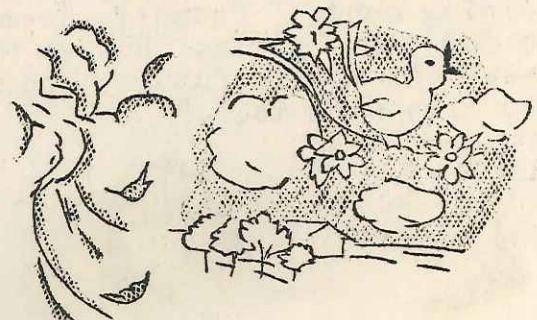
Work is progressing on a project showing the different types of homes in various countries that have been studied during the year in geography class. Each pupil makes his own selection of the home he wishes to build.
